So I have my A Level results. Now what?

Follow our guide to help you with your decisions about universities and courses.



MAKING CHOICES

Pick courses because *you* decide so, not because they're popular or prestigious. Explore with curiosity and avoid following the crowd.

EXPLORE AND BE BOLD

What are the new majors on offer? Cross disciplinary and interdisciplinary options are now available and encouraged. Take time to explore, as you don't know what you don't know!



INDICATIVE GRADE PROFILE (IGP)

IGPs provide you with a grade profile for each course - is your course the right one for you?

Balance idealism with realism.



Take a look at the core modules in your course - are you drawn towards them or do you only like the *idea* of the major?

IS IT TRUE THAT...?

Check your assumptions before selecting a course. You're more likely to excel if you love your course and are able to sustain its length and rigour.





KEEP AN OPEN MIND

Sometimes, the offers that come may not be your first choice. When facing rejection, keep an open mind, and give value to that which values you. The best thing you can do for yourself is to keep moving forward and excel in the field which chooses you!





OPEN HOUSES!

Attend them to obtain the most updated information on what's available. Take time to consider the plethora of options before choosing.

LOCAL UNIVERSITIES

HOW TO APPLY?

Apply online at each uni's admission portals.



WHEN TO APPLY?

From results day until 19 Mar 2023 for most courses. Aptitude-based admissions may have earlier deadlines - check uni websites directly for most updated information and don't miss your deadline!



INDICATIVE GRADE PROFILE (IGP)

Check out the IGPs of your courses of interest—this indicates the representative grades of applicants who gained entry in the previous year.

E.g. a major that quotes 90th percentile as "AAB/B" means that at the 90th percentile of admission, students achieved H2 subject grades of AAB and H1 content subject B. The IGP assumes that PW and GP are C grades.

UNIVERSITY ADMISSION SCORE (UAS)

To calculate your UAS, take the total score of 3H2 + 1H1 content subject + GP + PW.

If you take 4 H2s, the lowest of your H2s is converted into a H1 score. If you take 3 H2s and 1H1, all the scores are directly taken into account. The maximum score possible is 90.

GPA&PWB

4 H2s = AABB

OUR COUNSEL

When choosing your course options, you will want to be realistic - your UAS is at least close to, or at, the IGP of your desired courses, at the minimum 10th percentile.

The best situation would be where both your UAS and grades are at or beyond the published IGP.

Admission is primarily merit-based. When prioritizing courses in your applications, consider IGP and your UAS carefully. Rank order matters.

EXAMPLE

If a student scores the following:

- 3H2s (A, A, B) = 20+20+17.5
- Lowest H2 converted to H1 (B) = 8.75
- GP (A) + PW (B) = 10 + 8.75

Total UAS = 57.5 + 8.75 + 18.75 = 85

Caveat: popular courses can have more stringent criteria, and some courses have specific H2 prerequisites.

LOCAL UNIVERSITIES

PERSONAL STATEMENTS

Your statement should reflect the best sides of yourself, and highlight how and why you are a match for the course of study. Don't be afraid to advocate for yourself: focus on your strengths and who you are. Talk about academic as well as soft skills, which are relevant to the field of choice. Use your activities (both within and without school) wisely: do not just list achievements; reflect on what you learnt in the process. It is through your reflection that you demonstrate fit and understanding of the course. Keep it concise.

#HEOprotip: You may be tempted to ask your tutors for (unnecessary) references; avoid the urge to spam a university. It's good practice and good manners to submit only what is required. You should only ask for a reference if it is a stated requirement. Advocate for yourself instead!

INTERVIEWS

Prepare yourself well! Know yourself, know why you're interested in the course and how you're suited for it.

#HEOprotip: Practice speaking out aloud and practice listening. Remember that **every interview is a conversation**. Articulate your opinions and thoughts, get comfortable to the sound of your own voice, even as you get similarly comfortable with a two-way dialogue. Should your interview be online, ensure a secure connection and a conducive place for interviews. Of course, be it online or F2F, ensure you dress smartly for the occasion.

UNI OPEN HOUSES

Check out the university's Open House sites. Some require registration, so do sign up for what you're interested in.



DISCRETIONARY/APTITUDE-BASED ADMISSIONS

Discretionary admissions are applied for on the basis of exceptional talent/ability. Some examples which the universities cite: winning an international Olympiad medal, National Representative in arts/sports, having key leadership positions in organisations outside of school. Refer to the relevant university admissions websites for more details. **You do not need to apply under discretionary admissions if your UAS qualifies you for the course.**

#HEOprotip: When applying under discretionary admissions, choose what to reflect wisely. Avoid spamming: the universities limit you to a range of 3-10 activities. Thus, highlight your most exceptional achievements. I.e., activities for which you have won awards, show sustained involvement in, and where you may hold key positions/be a key contributor, making for meaningful reflection.

WHEN TO APPLY?


We will update our application timelines for the 2023/24 cycle by end May when the current cycle closes and universities refresh guidance.


